

As part of NIOB's corporate social responsibility, technical advice was rendered freely to the general public through the media (radio and television).

There was Building Condition Survey to ascertain the state and condition of some

pre-independence-days buildings in Nigeria.

More importantly, builders stepped up the NIOB Catchthem-Young

programme by visiting schools in their localities to give career talk about Building profession thereby making the young ones to be rightly informed to look in the direction of Building as they nurse their career dreams. Indeed, this year's Builders' Day was vigorous, momentous and eventful.

As we know, Builders' Day was founded to sensitise stakeholders in the built environment and the general



public on the need to follow laid down rules in building construction. Keeping the standards will not only prevent waste, save cost and give us value for investment, it will

save us lives and limbs, and save us the embarrassment that ensues when buildings go down.

We are witnesses to many incidents of building collapse in Nigeria. These incidents have caused us pains and dented the image of our professionals and the country as a whole.

We chose the incident of 13th March 2019 at 63 Massey Street, Ita-Faaji, Lagos as a token for this endeavour. On this day, young school children lost their lives and many were injured out of no fault of theirs but criminal neglect of carefree individuals. Investigations following that incident revealed that in our society, some persons were doing jobs they were not qualified to do, and regrettably, unchecked. What kind of society is it with an array of competent professionals that leaves its critical work in the hands of quacks to continually endanger lives,

investment and society?

Over the years, we have shouted ourselves hoarse in the bid to stop the incidence of building collapse. The Ita-Faaji incident once again demonstrates to us how our failure to do things right can haunt us collectively.

It is indeed an open sore that will take very long a time to heal. The victims are still very young so they will narrate the traumatic experience of Ita-Faaji as long as they live.

The NIOB is grateful to the

Lagos State Government led by Babajide Sanwo-Olu for institutionalising the mandatory requirement and processes for construction sites to be managed by only professional builders registered with the Council of Registered Builders of Nigeria (CORBON). This is a right step in tandem with **Builders** Registration CAP. B13LFN 2004. We urge other governors to do same. It is the best thing for the Nigerian society to help save

troubles us as builders seeing buildings on the shores of our country go down. It takes a great fortune to erect a building. We shouldn't lose it on account of quackery. 

Brief history of The Nigerian Institute of Building



The Nigerian Institute of Building (NIOB) has its origin in a parent body called the Builders' Society, which was founded in 1834 by a number of prominent Builders in London. This body was renamed the Institute of Builders in 1884. Then in 1965, the name was changed to Institute of Building (IOB).

As the organisation gained royal charter, it was renamed "The Chartered Institute of Building" (CIOB) in 1980.

The Institute of Building Nigeria Centre was formed by the IOB Nigerian members, who had returned home after studying Building in the United Kingdom.

This overseas centre of the London-based Institute of Building was officially inaugurated on Friday, 31st March, 1967 at the Auditorium of the Advanced Teachers Training College, University of Lagos, Akoka, Yaba, Lagos. The event was chaired by a distinguished guest, Sir. Mobolaji Bank-Anthony, KBE, FRSA, F. INST. D.

The Institute of Building Nigeria Centre, therefore, became the first overseas centre of the Institute of Building, London.

The first Chairman of IOB Nigeria Centre (by the election held on 26th March, 1967) was Mr. Simeon Oladiran Okikiolu. He was succeeded through election in 1968 by Mr. Fatai Isola Osikoya.

In 1969, Institute of Building Nigeria Centre sought for and got autonomy from the I.O.B. London Headquarters to transform into the Nigerian Institute of Building. Consequently, on 5th November, 1970, NIOB was officially inaugurated with a cocktail party at the University of Lagos, Akoka, Yaba, Lagos.

Core objectives of the Institute



COUNCIL OF REGISTERED BUILDERS OF NIGERIA (CORBON).

It was established by Act CAP B13LFN, 2004 (formerly known as Decree No 45 of 1989). CORBON was established to regulate and control the practice of building profession in all its aspects and ramifications.

WHO IS A REGISTERED BUILDER?

A registered Builder is a person who has received an approved standard of professional training and practice in building and found competent after due examination and his/her name is entered into the register of the Council.

TRAINING

At present, there are twenty five (31) Universities offering B.Sc Building Programme and fifty six (56) Polytechnics offering Natonal (ND) or / and Higher Natonal Diploma (HND) Building Programmes in Nigeria. A graduate of Building would have undergone pupilage period under the supervision of a fully registered builder and passed the appropriate examinations of the Nigerian Institute of Building (NIOB) and the interview of the Council of Registered Builders of Nigeria (CORBON), before attaining full professional status.

Why March 13 for Builders' Day?

day of grievous fatality caused by building collapse was thought most appropriate for Builders' Day in order to arouse the consciousness of participants in building projects on the consequences of defective construction work.

On 13th March, 2019, a five-storey building collapsed at No 63, Massey Street, Ita-Faaji, Lagos Island, leading to the death of 20 occupants, including pupils while many others sustained injury. The building was a residential one that was partly converted to a primary school. Quackery, inadequate building regulations and monitoring challenges were major causes of the March 13 calamity.

The out-come of investigations on this Ita-Faaji building collapse coupled with several previous building collapse cases in Lagos State made the government stipulate in the new Building Regulations of 2019 that building construction sites across Lagos State be managed by only Registered Builders.

This is a landmark regulation aimed at curbing incessant building collapse. Meanwhile, building collapse has been majorly due to quackery and lack of expertise in the management of building production on sites.

Invariably, Builders' Day is to echo the need for other states of the federation to emulate the 2019 result-oriented Building Regulations of Lagos State. The need to raise the lifespan of buildings cannot be over-emphasized.

Remembering School Children that perished in a collapsed building at ita-faaji, lagos island and victims of other building collapses in nigeria

xactly two years ago, (13th March, 2019,) a five-storey building collapsed at No 63 Massey Street, Ita-Faaji, Lagos Island, killing about 20 occupants, including many pupils.

This building that collapsed at Ita-Faaji immediately after Mr. Babajide Sanwo-Olu won the Lagos State gubernatorial election served as a challenge to his incoming government on the rise in the spate of building collapse and the importance of addressing the building collapse and the building collapse.

Meanwhile, the outcome of many investigations on collapsed buildings has identified inappropriate management of the building production process on sites as the major problem. The interwoven complex activities of building construction require expertise in their management. The expert to handle this delicate process is the trained and certified Builder, who has been licensed by the Council of Registered Builders of Nigeria (CORBON).

Following the collapse of the five-storey building at Ita-Faaji, the loophole in the law and development process that had been severally exploited to promote quackery on building sites, in Lagos State in

particular and Nigeria in general, was again identified by the panel of investigation. The Lagos State House of Assembly took steps to decisively block the loophole through a stakeholders public hearing on its physical planning and building control regulations which regulations were eventually signed by the Commissioner responsible for Physical Planning and Urban Development.

These steps birthed the 2019 Physical Planning and Building Control Regulations of Lagos State.

One of the key parts of the regulations is the correct and unambiguous provision of Section 4, Subsection 2 of the 2019 Lagos State Building Control Regulations which states: 'The site execution of

every building under construction shall be managed by a registered builder.'

The historical context and relevance of March 13 come through the building collapse of that day (in 2019), where innocent, helpless but promising school children lost their lives (due to system failure of older Nigerians) and reactions from within and outside Nigeria coupled with other events that took place after that day. March 13 is thus symbolically chosen to remember Ita-Faaji building collapse victims and all other victims of building collapse in various parts of the country.

What are the lessons learnt from this Ita-Faaji tragedy and many others? What things should we do to prevent a recurrence?

The main cause of the Ita Faaji calamity was quackery, which also remains the major cause of several building collapses in Nigeria.

Closely and generally associated to this fundamental cause is negligence with respect to appropriate building regulations and their enforcement on the part of the government.

The third factor in this series of building collapse is lack of accountability and failure to bring culprits to book.

There have been many building collapses in Nigeria. Conservatively, Lagos accounts for about 60% percent of the figure of collapses.

The worrisome question is: How many of those that participated in the construction of collapsed buildings have been prosecuted? How many culpable government officials have been made accountable? Even where there have been efforts at prosecution, sometimes come too little or too late to achieve the required effects of deterrence. Sometimes even other little efforts towards prosecution are either frustrated or prolonged. Of course, justice delayed is justice denied. Sentiments and political considerations have remained the clog in the wheel of justice. The doctrine of consequence is the appropriate method that can eradicate quackery from building sites in Nigeria.

The problem with building construction in Nigeria is that

some of those who are engaging in it as a business to make quick and cheap money only see the gains, not the risks. Additionally, some of those who are investing in building development have the mindset of profiteering at the expense of quality output. Consequently, construction work, they prefer to use quacks that would not insist on quality output. This is the reason why buildings constructed by many developers cannot stand the test of time.

As revealed in our record, most of the buildings that collapsed in Nigeria lacked professionalism in the production and construction process and its management. This is an aberration and an affront on the law of the Federal Republic of Nigeria that recognises a trained and licenced professional (the Professional Builder) to handle and manage the construction and production processes of every building.

A system that tolerates quackery which obviously does not insist on professionalism is bound to face repercussions such as witnessed two years ago at Ita-Faaji, Lagos Island. Use of experts and specialists will help this nation overcome the menace of building collapse.

The need for the Nigerian government to get rid of



quacks on all building sites in Nigeria cannot, therefore, be overemphasised. The respective states of the Federation should prioritise the safety of lives during and after construction by having laws and regulations that meet or exceed the basic minimum requirements of the Nigerian National Building Code. The use of experts in their various areas of competency in the entire building project delivery chain, that is from design to construction and even post construction, should be upheld.

Builders are the experts in the technology of building construction and maintenance. They manage the processes to achieve safe, sound, functional and economical buildings which all stakeholders, professionals and non professionals alike desire.

The development of resultoriented Building Regulations of Lagos State and attempts by some states to incorporate the well thought out project delivery requirements of the National Building Code in their urban development laws should be emulated by states of the federation which have not done so. This will help put in motion the machinery for orderliness and end the sordid story of incessant building collapse in our nation.

The lack of veritable National Building Code with adequate enforcement aggravates and A nation without building code leaves its construction sector to the whims and caprices of quacks and emergency profiteers.

accentuates the building collapse crisis. A nation without building code leaves its construction sector to the whims and caprices of quacks and emergency profiteers.

We hereby enjoin the Federal Government of Nigeria through the Honourable Minister of Works and Housing, Mr Babatunde Raji Fashola, SAN to expedite further actions on the National Building Code project. Giving legislative backing at the national and subnational levels are further steps in the right direction. The members of the public and the media should continue in the campaign to protect lives. The battle against building collapse is one that we

must all join hands together to win. Building collapses are m o s t l y a v o i d a b l e tragedies. We need not fall twice on the same proverbial stone. We must learn our lessons and save lives and property. This is the concern of the Nigerian Institute of Building, sister

professions in the building industry and all other good spirited organisations.

To commemorate the March 13 building collapse, Professional Builders (not 'Building Engineers', which is a wrong name and misnomer in Nigeria) in the 36 states of the federation and FCT are embarking on community service on building sites. March 13 remains a symbolic day to remember victims of building collapse and campaign against shoddy and unprofessional workmanship. It is a day to sensitise stakeholders on building projects and also the public on the need to construct to standard in order to prevent a repeat of Ita-Faaji calamity.

This second edition of the Builders' Day has its theme as 'Professional Builders'

Engagement in Building Production Management.' A lot of activities have been lined up for this day.

In a pro bono exercise engendered by need for social responsibility, Builders will pay visits to various building sites across the country and provide clients, developers and their workers technical advice and construction techniques that will help uplift and sustain the serviceability of their buildings.

Call-in programmes on TVs and radios will enable Professional Builders provide solutions to the technical challenges members of the public could be having in their homes and offices.

Pre- Builders' Day activities have seen Builders across the nation carry out Building Condition Survey on existing buildings and also Career Talk on Building Profession in order to draw attention for necessary actions.

The campaign against building collapse and substandard construction should be owned by all Nigerians. The public and private sectors should insist on using only the right professionals for their building projects. Leaving, by omission or commission, the building construction process to chances and nonprofessionalism is the way NEVER to go again. All professional stakeholders in the building industry should continue in teamwork while performing their unique roles. We are all in the business to save lives and promote public safety.

On this occasion, we empathise again with all the survivors of building collapse

and those who have lost loved ones in various collapses. The school children at Ita-Faaji and others who survived one collapse or the other need care and attention to pick up their lives again in addressing the scars. Help and counselling in overcoming the trauma of such collapse remains necessary.

On a final note, it is our prayer that the Almighty God give all relevant authorities the political will to stop quackery in the Nigerian building industry and end avoidable waste of lives and investments.



the profession.


Radio broadcast and interactive sessions with Magic FM and B.C.A. were held to discuss the importance of Professional Builders in building construction.






NIOB campaigned for the domestication of the National Building Code in Kano State




In Kogi State, builders focused on educating students on the differences between Building and other discipline like, Architecture, Estate Management and Civil

Observations

- 1. Maintenance Culture: Religious buildings appeared better maintained than institutional buildings or office complexes. E.g. Centenary Hall Ake Abeokuta owned by St John Anglican Church., National Mosque, Abuja.
- 2. Materials: Pre 1900 buildings were built with burnt bricks, lime, cement and sand. The presence of lime in the binding agent prevents cracks due to contraction and expansion caused by varying weather.
 - Such buildings were mostly produced with prefabricated concrete, hence they last longer.
- 3. Maintenance funds are available for religious buildings which promote regular maintenance unlike institutional buildings like Hope Waddell in Calabar which was well maintained up to 1960 before government took it over, had funding challenge for maintenance resulting in dilapidation of the structure.
- 4. Private residential buildings were also better maintained.
- 5. Wood used: These were well seasoned and preserved woods and had stand the test of time, from pre-1900 till date.
- 6. The survey reports from the state chapters revealed that most of our members need to come to terms with the practice of building survey. This may be due to the fact that the last national workshop of NIOB was done in 2003 in Kaduna.

Recommendations

- 1. The Committee recommends that NIOB national as a matter of urgency organise a national workshop on The Practice of Building Survey because of members who joined after the 2003 workshop.
- 2. The NIOB Research and Development Committee should research into the use of lime in

bonding and if found useful in promoting the lifespan of building, The NIOB should promote it's use Nationwide.


3. Prefabricated buildings should be considered for longer lifespan.



Truly, this is a commitment we must make and it requires more than sloganeering and all talk and no action. If we fail to do what we are meant to do, posterity would judge our motives, as well as our actions. It is therefore necessary for us as construction industry professionals to see it as something of shame when buildings collapse right under our watchful eyes. It would either be because our

eyes are defective or that we are collectively incompetent.

It is thus time for us to come, and let's reason together. This reasoning will not be because of us, either as individual professions in the construction industry or collectively as an industry, but about our future as a nation. It would be about the value we choose to place on our children, and to determine whether they have a right to safe, habitable and sustainable environment or not. I hope in this quest, we will make the right choices.

Let me conclude by associating with the Nigerian Institute of Building for putting this function together, particularly the President, Bldr. Kunle Awobodu FNIOB, who has been in the forefront of the urge to make building collapse in Nigeria a thing of the past. On behalf of the Nigerian Institute of Town Planners, I wish you a successful outcome.




I wish you fruitful deliberations and I appeal to the government to consider and promptly implement the resolutions of this assembly.



What it requires is advocacy. What we do is to promote the growth of the profession. That is actually what we are doing. There are so many issues in this country which are not alright; and we come up as groups to address these issues. The number one is building collapse: As we heard, when a building collapses, the first culprit from our circle is a builder, but from outsiders the first culprit is an engineer. So we need to attack this because lives are involved, we are losing our members. The builder is doing our work, the builder works w i t engineers; they also work with quantity surveyors. So we have now brought in a e understandin g between most of us in the built industry, that we must work as a team, we must watch

our back for the profession to grow.

From time immemorial all these settings were not out. You know as a human being there is this desire to feel you are everywhere, but everybody knows what it is supposed to do. We all went to schools and these things are clearly defined. I had an engagement with quantity surveyors, I had meetings with them and I told them clearly, now let us take it this way - how can quantity

surveyors cost engineering materials for me? It is not possible. I cannot go to the field and be counting blocks. That is not my job.
